Welcome

Hello and welcome to the Voice Through LAMP training! As a valued educator, therapist, or advocate in our community, you will be introduced to a new way of thinking about how to help our students meet and exceed their unique communication needs. You will gain an understanding of the Language Acquisition through Motor Planning (LAMP) methodology, and you will learn how to use this exciting new tool to assist students with communicating in a manner that is truly authentic, functional, and personal to them.

This course is designed to provide you with tools, strategies, and insight on how to support all students in finding their voice as well as hearing and responding to the voices of others in your classroom. You will engage in practice, reflection, and application to learn how to create learning opportunities for students that are sensitive to their individual communication pathways.

We'll investigate: The foundational principles of Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC), the motor learning tenets that underpin LAMP Planning resources that elevate student voice, motivation, and engagement.

Course Description

This course equips educators with the knowledge and tools to support students with complex communication needs using Language Acquisition through Motor Planning (LAMP). Through hands-on modeling, real-life integration, and compassionate instruction, participants learn to create inclusive environments where every student can find and express their voice.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, participants will be able to:

- Implement LAMP-based AAC strategies across instructional settings.
- Facilitate aided language input through motor planning and consistent modeling.
- Evaluate barriers to student motivation and engagement.
- Develop strategies to improve student motivation and engagement.
- Support students in developing individualized, functional communication skills.
